Honoring Fallen U.S. Service Members

Dear Colleagues,

Like so many across the country, we are saddened by devastating events continuing to unfold in Afghanistan. A suicide bombing near Kabul's airport last week killed 13 U.S. service members, including nine Marines and a sailor based at Camp Pendleton. Other members of our military and hundreds of civilians were killed or injured. These heartbreaking losses represented the deadliest day for American forces in Afghanistan since August 2011. Flags are flying at half-staff on our campuses as a mark of respect for these U.S. service members and other victims killed in the attack.

Many of us are connected in some way to these events, whether we ourselves have a loved one in harm's way, or as members of our global community. Our own diverse community includes employees and students from around the world, as well as veterans and active members of the military, some of whom have served in Afghanistan. The U.S. has evacuated more than 100,000 people out of Afghanistan in recent weeks. More continue to flee, including some local families. Our region is also home to some of the largest concentrations of military personnel and veterans in the United States.

We want to again offer our support and highlight resources available during this difficult time.
