Civil Unrest

Civil unrest may occur during demonstration procedures and can cause a variety of subsequent issues such as violence and assault, disorderly conduct, vandalism. Minimizing and preventing these occurrences is the main objective.

Mitigation:

- 1. Ensure public officials are well informed regarding the potential for civil unrest.
- 2. Confer with local, state and federal law enforcement to monitor the potential for civil unrest or disturbance.
- 3. Estimate need for auxiliary forces.
- 4. Coordinate with local broadcast media to ensure timely and accurate information is released via the PIO, utilize Communication Plan.
- 5. Determine the availability of shelters and obtain shelter agreements.

Response:

- 1. Immediately carry out those action requirements necessary to preserve life and or property, including the deployment of required resources.
- 2. Alert all persons in the immediate vicinity, of the situation via the Communication Plan.
- 3. Lock all doors and windows.
- 4. Close blinds to prevent flying glass.
- 5. If necessary, your department may decide to cease work operations.
- 6. If evacuation is necessary, follow directions from evacuation plan annex.

Recovery:

- 1. Gather a damage assessment based on the map of building assessment zones and utilize building marshals as needed.
- 2. Refer to the Continuity of Operations Plan for reopening of campus or campus areas.
- 3. Obtain information from utilities regarding outages, length of repair, safety, etc.
- 4. Assess citizen / community needs for individual assistance and or public assistance.
- 5. Local civil unrest issues are unlikely to lead to a Presidential declaration of disaster, however, if a Presidential declaration of disaster is made, file "Request for Public Assistance" to apply for assistance as soon as possible with the proper state or federal agency.
- 6. Perform an incident critique as soon as possible with all possible response organizations.
