<p>1. Security Monitoring Proposals Update</p>	<p>Nicole reported on the emergency call box installation and replacement, including costs, features, and timeline. DSC is reviewing the use of one time funds to cover the cost of the security upgrades. A discussion followed regarding the related camera procedure and next steps for implementing it as a usable document. The procedure will first be sent to the Chancellors Cabinet for review and then the legal department for recommendations. Nicole will obtain a copy of local college camera procedures for reference and comparison.</p>
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<p>2. Classroom Door Locks- Update on Plan</p>	<p>Sue explained that the classroom door locks are still moving forward in a phased approach. To date the number of classroom doors covered in each proposition has been identified so that they may be systematically replaced and to ensure that efforts are not duplicated.</p>
<p>3. MOU with County for PODS</p>	<p>There was overwhelming support to assist the County with their medical POD placement needs. The council inquired to disruption of services or classes which should be little to no impact. The Grossmont and Cuyamaca EPC committees have both endorsed moving forward with the MOU agreement. Nicole will reach out to the county representative to clarify questions that were asked and then send the recommendations forward.</p> <p>Update 7/16/18- Nicole reached out and received a quick response to the following questions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Would you expect campus staff to assist in the POD? Yes, we would expect campus staff to operate the POD. We will be offering training to ensure your designated staff are able to do so.2. What if someone comes in sick? Won't they spread it to others on campus? As long as your staff and students take the medical countermeasures, they should be

	<p>protected. Also, not all diseases that might be used in a biological attack are spread person-to-person. For example, anthrax is not contagious.</p> <p>3. How many other PODs are there in East County?</p> <p>We have a handful of other closed POD sites in East County, and one open POD site. Every closed POD takes some of the pressure off of the open PODs in an area, and I think Grossmont College and Cuyamaca College would significantly reduce the burden on our open POD in East County.</p>
<p>4. CPTED Review and Updates</p>	<p>Nicole reviewed the Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) Reports with the council. Each campus gets an annual report with recommendations to assist with crime prevention. There was kudos for the facilities and maintenance teams for tending to last year's recommendations so quickly. The new recommendations are on par with current planning efforts.</p>
<p>5. SDSO Sheriff's Proposal</p>	<p>The 5 year service contract for the Sheriff's department was sent over for renewal. There was strong support from the Council to continue the contract given the strong rapport the deputies have built with the campus community. After an initial shaky start the department has made strides to</p>

	immerse themselves into the campus culture. Many compliments came from council members which were extended from students and staff.
6. Possible Solar on Parking Lots	Sue discussed a potential new program to add solar panels over the parking lots. The program would reduce energy costs, provide shading to vehicles and pedestrians, increase lighting in the parking areas and allow for EV charging in the lots. While it is still in beginning stages, Sue would like to gauge interest and support for the project. The council was extremely receptive to this idea and mentioned how great the panels are at other locations around San Diego. We will continue to move forward with the research and proposal phase.
