1. 2013 Facilities Master Plan	Deborah Shepley discussed the 2013 Facilities Master Plan (FMP). The Facilities Planning Principles of the 2013 FMP include a focus on students to develop and improve campuses and facilities to support student success. The 2016 FMP Refresh is not a replacement of the 2013 Plan. The Refresh addresses changes that have occurred since 2013, and provides an updated framework for future development. The Planning for Sustainable Facilities section of the 2013 FMP was distributed and reviewed. Some of the sustainability recommendations contained in the Plan have already been implemented. The sustainability goals contained in the 2013 Plan are overarching goals to frame sustainability plans and are still valid as the District moves forward.
